Traditions...I think of Japanese culture and performing arts (Noh, Kabuki, Gagaku, Customs...Work and lifestyles that have been continued for 1-3 generations

*My own lifestyle

① I use eco-bags (bags to carry groceries home in) when I only need a small amount of groceries, but carrying them around with groceries inside is heavy and tiring, so I usually go shopping with a travel suitcase... I try to make sure the inside doesn't get dirty even when I put groceries inside. When I buy city-designated garbage bags at the same time, if I only need a small amount of groceries, I take one out after purchase and put the groceries in it to carry home

I believe that Japanese traditions should be passed on to the future. However, due to financial difficulties, I do not purchase any items that are only used during special occasions such as New Year's or Christmas

I think of New Year's as just one day out of 365, so I never think about "renewing my spirit" and I think I would never go to a shrine for the first time in the year. For example, I would think that any day would be fine to "renew my spirit" on a midsummer day. I don't have a TV, so New Year's Eve and New Year's programs are completely irrelevant to me. I watch the news online, several times a day, without fail
